
Another grant of R50 000 was received from the Carl & Emily Fuchs Foundation, which was received towards the 2020 HEDSA Symposium.

NEWS FROM DISABILITY UNITS

Stellenbosch University

LEAD WITH DISABILITY

We successfully developed and ran two four-week sessions of a developed and accredited Lead with Disability course in 2019 by one of our Disability Unit staff. Students are accredited with this on their academic transcripts, once they have met all the outcomes of the course. The sessions consisted of theoretical inputs as well as experiential exercises. Some of the themes covered were universal access, universal access design, reasonable accommodation and progressive realisation. This workshop series was co-facilitated by students with disabilities.



STELLENBOSCH DISABILITY NETWORK

The Stellenbosch Disability Network is a constructive collaboration between Stellenbosch University (SU) and its town. You will know that SU is integrated with Stellenbosch town. Challenges faced sometimes by our students and staff on campus that impact on daily functioning and the safety of getting around, involve pavement conditions, pedestrian crossings with their buzzers and parking. These are functions of the Stellenbosch Municipality. We liaise with them closely about these. One exciting event that takes place each year in celebration the International Day for Persons with Disabilities, is a walk that we do around the Stellenbosch CBD, to raise awareness around disability matters in Stellenbosch and its surrounds.



AFRINEAD 2020 AND THE 2020 YEAR FOR DISABILITY (see notice of AfriNEAD conference)

The African Network of Evidence to Action will be holding their 6th annual conference in Cape Town from 30 November 2020 until 3 December 2020. The theme of the conference is "**Disability unplugged – Beyond Conventions and Charters: what really matters to persons with disabilities in Africa**". You have a chance to present your research, project or disability inclusive practices as these fit into the theme of the conference – find information attached.

Additionally, Stellenbosch University is choosing to spotlight disability inclusive practices and programmes and highlight the road travelled and the way ahead, during 2020. Look out for the range of activities that will take place.

University of KwaZulu-Natal

Disability Support Unit staff conduct a Capacity Building Programme focusing on Awareness, Training and Interventions

Staff at the UKZN's Disability Support Unit (DSU) conducted a capacity building programme on the Westville campus on 4 October 2019. Participants included various DSU staff inclusive of DSU Coordinators, Officers and Trainers across 5 campuses.

The objectives of the Programme were to discuss services provided to students with disabilities, the challenges confronting students living with various disabilities and to explore appropriate interventions. Some of these services and interventions include reasonable accommodation requests, assessments, academic and social counselling, one to one in-depth consultation/intervention with students and access to appropriate services for students who are deaf such as sign language interpreters. Other services also entailed liaising with structures both on and off campus to meet the needs of students with visual challenges inclusive of referrals internal to UKZN as well as external (such as specialised hospitals)

Presentations were made by DSU staff and an external guest speaker. The informative presentations included *University Students living with Autism Spectrum Disorder* (Dr Faaiza Shaikh); *Somatoform Disorder: A Case Study for Psycho Social Concessions for Examinations* (Dr Rosh Subrayen); *Disability Equity Training* (Mr Nevil Balakrishna); *Supporting the learning of Deaf Students in higher education: A case study of the University of KwaZulu-Natal* (Mr Mongezi Zondo and Ephraim Shabane); *and Visual Impairment and Low Vision* (Guest Optometrist Dr Casandra Helen Seethal).

Some of the challenges experienced by the Disability Support Unit staff included low levels of awareness among the university community on the various types of disabilities. This included cases such as Autism Spectrum Disorder and Somatoform Disorder. In addition, engagement with internal and external stakeholders was minimal when it came to supporting the learning of students who are deaf. Other challenges related to a lack of a structured referral system and an advisory committee for students with visual challenges, variations in the application of reasonable accommodations for student with disabilities and low levels of computer awareness and usage by students with disabilities. Discussions also included the possibility of re-evaluating the frameworks utilised by DSU presently, when dealing with students' issues.

It was recommended that steps be taken to raise awareness on the issues experienced by students with disabilities including key issues of confidentiality, disclosure and stigma. There needed to be more engagement of internal stakeholders such as College departments, College Student Support and Campus Eye Clinic among others. External collaboration and engagement was equally important and

this included the KZN Mental Health Advocacy Group, Natal, Blind and Deaf Society and schools. In addition, there is a need for strategies and interventions in relation to establishing appropriate referral structures for students with disabilities and establishing committees such as a Reasonable Accommodation Committee. The importance of computer training for students with disabilities and the safeguarding assessment documents was also emphasised. Furthermore, Disability in itself needed to be underpinned by a respective framework such as a Disability Equality Framework.

Participants found the session extremely useful. Mr Mongezi Zondo (PMB Disability Coordinator) conveyed that he thoroughly enjoyed this programme and felt that he gained knowledge on various aspects of disability which can be implemented in his daily engagements with students.

Two students with disability from Business Studies who received assistive devices were also part of the meeting. Students were given an opportunity to share their testimonies as well as the challenges they encountered before and after the support they received from the college. This circle might become bigger as the suggestion to invite more organizations and experts in the disability area was brought forward.

Student Support Services is looking forward to working with these organization and the organizations also shared the same sentiments with the SSS. The organizations expressed their excitement with the journey the SSS unit and the college is about to embark on come 2020 and confirmed that they are more than willing to assist the college in their endeavours.

Xolani received a brand new wheelchair, Asameodwa received a brand new mini laptop programmed with programs to cater for his needs and Nikho received a brand new hearing aid.

The event was not going to be possible if it was not for the assistance from the Senior Manager: Disability Support Unit -Mr Hirohito Dikobo from NSFAS as well as the support staff from NSFAS

Disability Support Unit. NSFAS through their private funding managed to provide our students with assistive devices and also made funds available for Human Support for Asameodwa.

The parents of the recipients were also in attendance when the SSS Unit handed over the devices to the students and they couldn't hold back their tears with excitement. "I don't know how to thank you, words are not enough to thank you for what you have done for my son", said one of the excited parent.
